

Down the Rabbit Hole: Exploring professional identity formation in doctors who pursue additional training

ABSTRACT Extra training beyond that which is required to practice is becoming increasingly common amongst specialty physicians and surgeons in Canada. For many this may mean additional years of clinical or research training, a graduate degree, or a combination of all of the above. During this time, doctors may be trainees, qualified practitioners, and students all at the same time. This talk will explore the experiences of qualified physicians in their pursuit of additional training as well as the effects of this on their professional identity formation.

ABOUT Dr. Mercedes Chan is an Assistant Professor of Pediatrics, an Adjunct Assistant Professor in the Division of Community Engagement, and a pediatric rheumatologist at the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Canada. She completed her medical training at the University of Hong Kong followed by a pediatrics residency at the University of Saskatchewan, a pediatric rheumatology fellowship at UBC, and a clinical educator fellowship through the UBC Center for Health Education Scholarship. Her medical education interests center on professional identity formation in doctors and elements within doctors' communities of practice that shape that identity. Dr. Chan is passionate about improving access to care for children with pediatric rheumatic disease around the world through education. She regularly teaches in China and South Africa and is heavily involved in the development of international pediatric rheumatology e-learning resources.
